#### **OBJECTIVES**

- To restore to usefulness, within a reasonable time and in an economical manner, areas of the District which are presently blighted from water pollution.
- 2. To plan and coordinate activities to control and prevent air pollution in the region through the development of compatible standards and implementation plans.

#### Program Classification

03. Interstate Sanitation Commission—The Interstate Sanitation Commission is a tri-state agency created by the states of New Jersey, New York and Connecticut through enabling legislation and a tri-state compact(RS 32:18-1 et seq. and RS 32:19-1 et seq.) The Interstate Sanitation Commission District extends approximately from Sandy Hook on the New Jersey coast to Include all of New York Harbor, north on the Hudson River to the northerly boundaries of Westchester and Rockland counties, easterly into Long Island Sound to the New Haven, Connecticut shore, to Port Jefferson on the north shore of Long Island, and along the south shore of long Island extending easterly to Fire Island Inlet. The Commission makes rules, regulations and orders for the abatement of water pollution and may resort to the courts for enforcement. The Commission's program plan for water pollution abatement is designed to provide assistance in an effective coordinated approach to regional problems. The Commission is also the official planning and coordinating agency for the New Jersey-New York-Connecticut air quality control region, though it does not have air pollution abatement enforcement powers. The Commission conducts studies; undertakes research, testing and development; gathers and disseminates data to other public and private organizations or agencies; does sampling to track sources of air pollutants and refers complaints to an appropriate agency or agencies of the states, along with data necessary to take corrective action.

- 2. To conduct and sponsor research on water resources.
- 3. To coordinate the activities and programs of Federal, State, municipal and private agencies concerned with water resources administration.
- 4. To improve environmental quality within the Basin.

# 90. MISCELLANEOUS EXECUTIVE COMMISSIONS—Continued 40. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT 43. ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY 9140. DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION

#### Program Classification

O2. Delaware River Basin Commission—This Commission, under the Delaware River Basin Compact (C32:11D—1 et seq.), cooperates as a regional agency for the planning, conservation, utilization, development, management and control of water and related natural resources of the Delaware River Basin. The Compact includes the states of Belaware, New York, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the Federal government. Each year the Commission adopts a water resources program which it proposes be undertaken by the Commission and other governmental and private agencies, organizations and persons during the ensuing six years or such other reasonable period. The Commission is empowered to allocate the waters of the Basin to and among the states and their respective political subdivisions, and to impose conditions, obligations and release requirements related thereto, subject to certain limitations. It is also empowered to acquire, operate and control projects and facilities for the storage and release of waters and may assess the cost thereof upon water users. The Commission may undertake investigations and surveys, and acquire and construct, operate and maintain projects and facilities to control potential pollution and abate existing pollution. The Commission may plan, design, construct and operate and maintain projects and facilities for flood damage reduction and has the power to restrict the use of property within the area of a flood plain so as to minimize the flood hazard. The Commission provides for the development of water-related public sports and recreational facilities through the construction, maintenance and administration of such facilities. The Commission may develop and operate, or authorize to be developed and operated, dams and related facilities and appurtenances for the purpose of generating hydroelectric power. The appropriation recommended below represents New Jersey's share of the Commission's budget.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- 1. To provide disposal capacity for specified low-level radioactive waste generated within State borders.
- 2. To assure the proper, safe and efficient management and disposal of these wastes in accordance with established procedures.
- 3. To provide the legal framework for a cooperative regional approach for meeting state responsibilities.

#### Program Classification

10. Northeast Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Commission—This Commission was created September 1, 1983 (NUSA 32:31-1 et seq.) and enters New Jersey as a party state within a compact which currently includes the State of Connecticut. The Commission acts in an advisory and coordinative capacity for the administration of the compact and ensures that the states' collective interest are considered in the siting, development and management of regional facilities. Membership is comprised of one member per party state or two per host state, to be appointed by the Governor.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- 1. To operate and maintain the free bridges and their approaches.
- 2. To protect Commission property and the public using the free bridges.

#### Program Classification

07. Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission—This Commission was created (RS 32:8-1 et seq.) in December, 1934, by compact executed by the Governors of Pennsylvania and New Jersey, and duly authorized by their respective Legislatures. It consists of five members from each state appointed to purchase and to make free privately-owned toll bridges crossing the Delaware River north of the stone-arch bridge at Trenton, New Jersey and Morrisville, Pennsylvania, to the New York state line. The bridges purchased and freed of tolls are maintained jointly and all expenditures borne equally by both states. At the present time, there are 13 free bridges under the jurisdiction of this Commission.

The Commission has constructed six toll bridges over the Delaware River north of the line dividing Philadelphia and Bucks counties (as extended across the river to New Jersey) to the New York state line. They were financed by the issuance of revenue bonds. Tolls are charged on these bridges until such time as the bonds are retired, at which time, the structures become free to be maintained in the same manner as the present free bridges over the Delaware. This budget is for the free bridges only.

The Commission is also responsible for the review of any legislation concerning capital appropriations or indebtedness of the State. In addition, the Commission prepares recommendations concerning maintenance of physical properties and equipment of State agencies.

The Commission, comprised of 33 members, has the primary mission of developing recommendations to ensure that current and future State and local expenditures are equalized with revenue requirements and provide an equitable distribution of the cost of government, including methods utilized by the State in the financing of educational aid formulas.
